

HEALTH HAZARD EVALUATIONS AND MEDICAL SURVEILLANCE

NIST S 7101.29

1. PURPOSE

The purpose of this suborder is to establish the requirements and associated roles and responsibilities to ensure NIST staff, both federal employees and associates, are protected from potential health hazards through the appropriate medical surveillance.

2. BACKGROUND

a. <u>NIST P 7100.00</u> articulates NIST's commitment to making occupational safety and health an integral core value and vital part of the NIST culture, in part by complying with applicable laws, regulations, and other promulgated safety and health requirements.

3. APPLICABILITY

a. The provisions of this suborder, with the exceptions of those specified in Section 3.b, apply to all NIST staff who, during the conduct of their work at any NIST workplace, could be exposed to one or more potential health hazards:

(1) Identified in this document;

(2) Identified in Appendix G of NIST S 7101.60; or

(3) Specifically called out by OSHA Chemical Specific Health Standards, please see Appendix B of NIST S 7101.59.

b. Specific provisions of this suborder that do not apply to covered associates:

(1) Obtaining medical services and/or tests through NIST that are required of individual 35 medical surveillance programs; and 36 37 NOTE: OSHE shall perform the health hazard evaluations (HHEs) associated 38 39 with the work which involves the potential exposure to the health hazard to make the determination of the need for medical surveillance, but the associate's home 40 organization/employer is responsible for providing the medical services and/or 41 tests required of each medical surveillance program. 42 43 NOTE: NIST is permitted to provide funding to the home organization/employer 44 such that the required medical services and/or tests can be obtained. This should 45 be specified in associate's grants or agreements. 46 47 (2) Obtaining individual-specific, personal protective equipment (PPE) through NIST. Per 48 NIST S 7101.21, NIST may provide generic PPE for covered associates, i.e., PPE which 49 can be worn by anyone and must either remain at NIST or be disposable, e.g., hard hats, 50 non-prescription safety glasses, earmuffs, lab jackets. The home organization/employer 51 52 is responsible for providing any individual-specific PPE, e.g., prescription safety glasses, custom-fitted hearing protection, custom-fitted safety shoes. 53 54 c. The provisions of this suborder do not apply to medical surveillance/bioassays for internal 55 radiation exposures/doses. These are covered exclusively by the relevant programs for 56 NIST's NRC licenses (SNM-362, TR-5). 57 58 59 4. 161		(a) Work authorization procedures (e.g., hazard review or job hazard analysis), both
162		during creation and periodic review;

164		(b) Assignment to specific job duties such as reactor operators, hazardous waste handlers
165		grounds crew (see Appendix B Section 1);
166		
167		(c) Safety and health consultations;
168		
169		(d) Periodic review of NIST's chemical inventory; and

171		(e) Workplace inspections.

175		(1) When a potential health hazard is identified via Section 6.b(1), OSHE shall conduct a
176		HHE prior to staff being exposed to the potential health hazard.

181		be in the corresponding medical surveillance program;

445	(a) Ensure they complete all medical services and tests related to the medical surveillance
446	program(s) they are enrolled in prior to engaging in that work;

450	(c) Notify their supervisor or sponsor if they believe their exposure to the health hazard
451	has increased.

453	(4) First-level supervisors of staff performing work which requires enrollment in a medical

457	protocols listed in the hazard review; and

460	hazard has increased.

463	hazard specifies the requirement for a competent person, OSHE shall provide that person
464	
465	(a) The competent person shall perform duties specified in the medical surveillance
466	procedures for the health hazard. These duties may include, but are not limited to:

530 531		outcomes.
532	d.	Qualified Person – An individual who, by possession of a recognized degree, certificate, or
