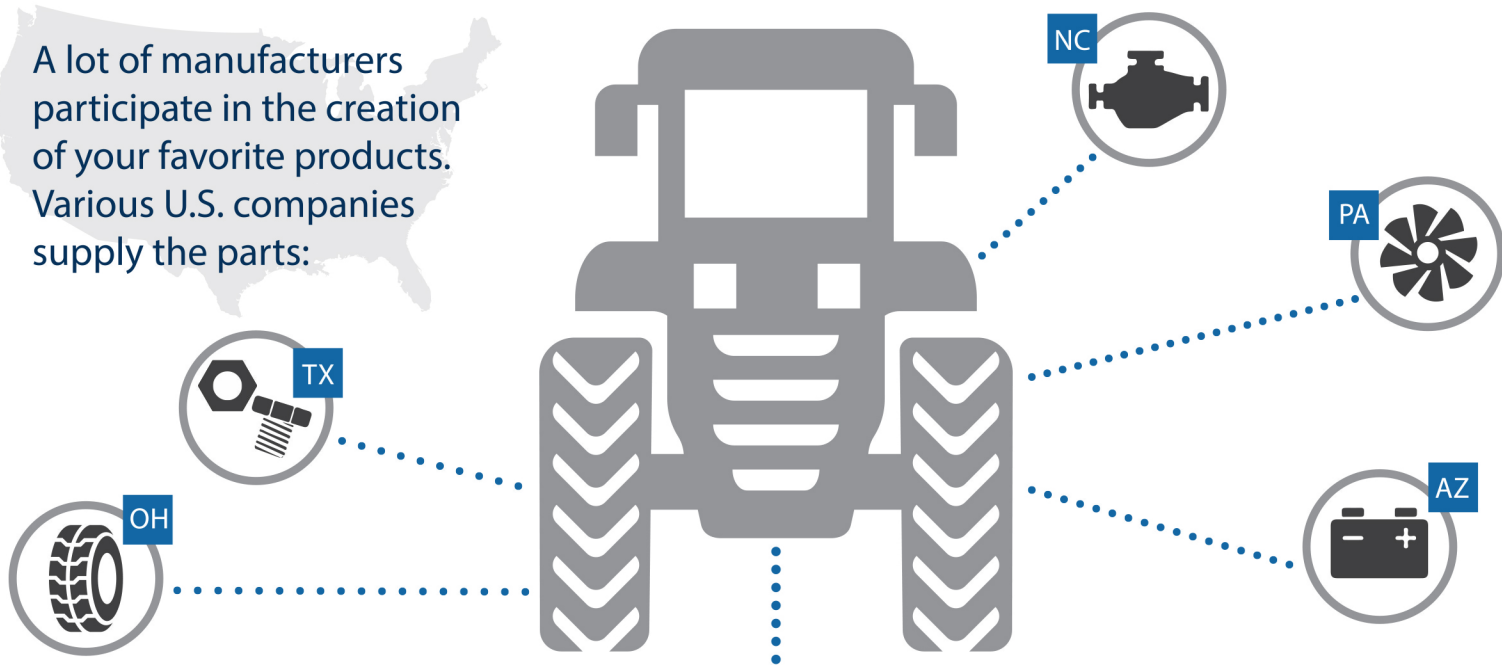

Many of these suppliers are small companies:

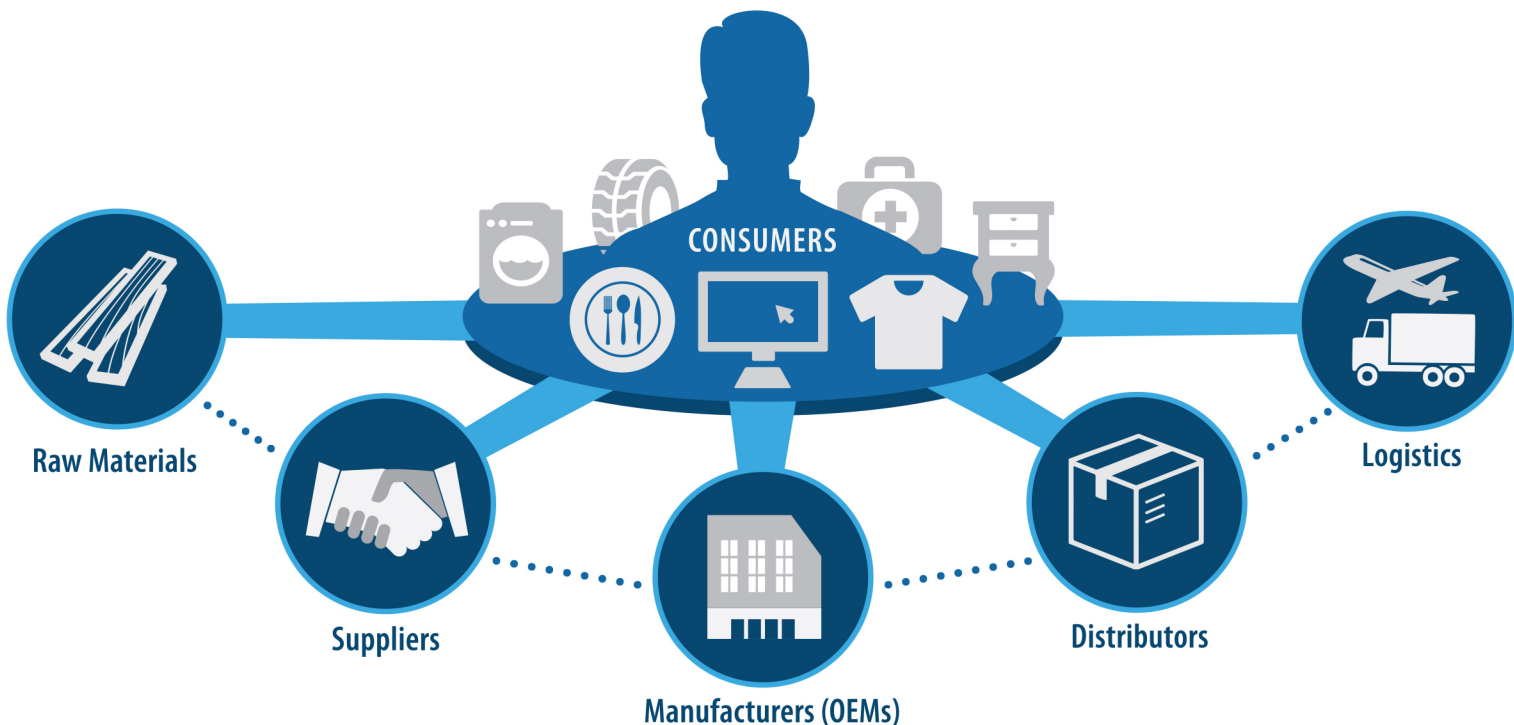
