



Chris E. Taylor is a Forensic Chemist with the US Army Criminal Investigation Laboratory (USACIL) - Defense Forensic Science Center (DFSC) in the Trace Evidence and Drug Chemistry Branches. Chris received his B.S. in Forensic Science from Michigan State University in 1992. Prior to joining the USACIL, Chris worked for the Georgia Bureau of Investigation-Division of Forensic Sciences.

Chris has 10 years of supervisory experience and over 28 years in forensic science. He has served the OSAC as a member, Executive Secretary and Vice Chair of the Chemistry and Instrumental Analysis SAC, Affiliate to the Materials (Trace) SC, and co-chaired and member of task groups in the development of interdisciplinary standards. Chris is a member of ASTM, past president of the American Board of Criminalistics; co-founder, past president of the American Society of Trace Evidence Examiners, AAFS-Fellow, and member of the ASCLD, CLIC, MAFS and SAFS. He also serves on the NIJ Technical Work Group for the development of research needs and the review of research proposals.
